#### FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings dear Sisters in Christ,

I'm not a winter person. Period. I don't like cold. I don't like snow. And I really don't like ice. So why do I still live in Wisconsin? That's a good question and one I have asked myself many times in the past few weeks as I'm shoveling snow for the umpteenth time.



The answer is quite simple. This is where my roots are. Where my family is. Where God needs me to be. So instead of focusing on what I don't like about winter, I am trying – really hard – to focus on what I do have to deal with winter. Unlike so many, I have a warm house to live in, protecting my family and me from the harsh elements. I have warm clothes, coats, boots and mittens. We have the tools to remove the snow and ice. I have no legitimate reason to complain about the cold, so I won't. Or at least not often.

Even though the snow banks are high and the sub-zero temps are back, spring is in the air. Several of the conferences have set the dates for their Days of Renewal and summer retreats. We've also set the dates for our second annual Days of Enrichment so please, check out the list of upcoming dates and get them on your schedule.

For a more inclusive environment, I have asked our conference coordinators to meet more frequently with our SWO Board. Our recent meeting took place in mid-January at Augustana Lutheran in Cumberland. (A shout out to the Barb Garling and crew for the great hospitality). Using a workshop format, we focused on the Circle of Influence/Circle of Conflict (from Stephen Covey's works) and determined where we were as an organization. It provided the basis for the afternoon session, where using the APA process (thanks Bishop Laurie!), the women identified (as an organization) what we wanted to accomplish, what we wanted to preserve and what we wanted to avoid. The day ended with draft action plans that included creation of a Facebook page, updated website design, and future learning opportunities for women. These action plans are a work in progress and once firmed up will be shared with all. In the meantime, please feel free to ask your conference reps about them.

Continuing our support of Women of the ELCA, SWO of NW Wisconsin again awarded scholarships to women who have been called to ordained ministry or other full-time work in the church. Out of ten potential applicants, five women applied and received scholarships this year. Recipients are: Bethany Ringdal (Pilgrim-Superior), Emily Stelling (Milltown), Jenny Hatleli (Central-Chippewa Falls), Katie Wagner (Christ-Menomonie), and Hannah Olson (Immanual-Strum). Please keep these sisters in your prayers as they continue their journey of faith.

"Give justice to the weak and fatherless, maintain the right of the afflicted and the destitute. Rescue the weak and needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked." Psalms 82: 3-4.

Acting to end human trafficking is a priority for Women of the ELCA. We are joining our Sisters throughout Wisconsin to push for a Safe Harbor Bill in Wisconsin. Currently, youth under the age of 18 can be prosecuted for prostitution instead of being recognized as the victims they are. The Women of the East Central Wisconsin Synod recently visited their representatives and Senators in Madison to discuss this subject and to urge their elected officials to sponsor and support LRB 0568 – Safe Harbor for Trafficked Youth. Instead of being prosecuted for prostitution, we want them to receive the help and services they need to heal and become productive members of society. I urge each of you to contact your state legislators and ask for their support in this endeavor.

If you don't know who your state legislators are, you can find their contact information by visiting the Wisconsin State Legislature webpage <a href="http://legis.wisconsin.gov/">http://legis.wisconsin.gov/</a> and typing in your address to the "who are my legislators" box on the right-hand side of the page.

Sign/give your name and address. It is great if you want to include that you are a Lutheran woman or part of Women of the ELCA.

A second bill that we are asking for support is LRB-1118/1 – Fighting Human Trafficking – Truckers Representative, Jeremy Thiesfeldt and Senator LaTonya Johnson have a bill, Assembly Bill 22, that all new

truck drivers receive education in human trafficking signs, to help prevent human trafficking and to help law enforcement save girls lives and catch the traffickers.



This bill made it far last session but did not get to the Senate floor in time before session ended. The bill will receive a public hearing at 10:00 am on Thursday, March 14<sup>th</sup> at the State Capitol. The bill needs three people from the public to come and testify in support of the bill in order for it to move forward. My counter-part from the East Central Synod of Wisconsin, Shirley Paulson, will be one of the three to testify.

I realize that discussions regarding human trafficking and our efforts to stop it is an uncomfortable topic for many. That is unfortunate. I sincerely mean no disrespect to anyone; however, not discussing the horrors of trafficking, and the negative impact it has on the women and children involved, only supports it. We must be **BOLD** in our efforts to end human trafficking and our support to the victims. I believe it is what God is asking us to do.

Please pray for our elected officials that they see the worth in passing these bills. Please pray for the thousands and thousands of women and children that are being exploited / trafficked. And please pray for those of us that are working so hard to stop it.

#### FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

I have nearly completed a 'Grandma, Tell Me Your Story' book for my granddaughter. I will give it to her this May on the day she graduates from college. There are dozens of questions in this book: What is a special meal your mom made for you?" "What's the best thing that's been invented since you were a kid?" "Did you ever fall in love at first sight?"



One of the questions at the end of this book is, "What would you most like to be remembered for?" That question gave me pause. I answered some typical grandma responses such as being a nurturing mother, a person with a sense of humor, someone who is organized but also flexible. And then I stopped to realize that I wanted something more profound, more ME. So, I wrote, "Someone who knows where I've been, where I'm going and is content and hopeful in the present."

As I apply this answer to my Christian faith, I do know where I've been; I have been brought to the



baptismal font where my parents presented me as an infant to receive the gift of holy baptism – a grace-filled water of life "through the water of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit. This Spirit he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life" (Titus 3:5-7.

I know where I'm going. At my death I will be raised up to "share with all the faithful the endless joy and peace won through the glorious resurrection of Christ our Lord." I will be acknowledged as a "sheep of [Jesus'] fold, a lamb of [Jesus'] own flock, a sinner of [Jesus']

redeeming" and will be received into the "blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light" (from the Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 283).

#### FROM THE TREASURER

For me, February has been a very exasperating month with what seemed like a snow storm every other day. I personally was not praising God for all the snow as I shoveled to clear the driveway, paths and decks for the umpteenth time. But when the sun shone so bright, the landscape and mounds of snow were indeed beautifully and marvelously created and glimmering white. The words of the hymn "Earth and All Stars" spoke to me. In these verses, a host of natural and cultural phenomena, including the elements of snow, wind, and hail are invited to sing to the Lord. Indeed, may each of us make a joyful noise, sing praises to our creator and celebrate the marvelous things that God shares.



We also thank and praise God for the active, faithful, and joyful stewardship of Women in the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin. It is through <u>you</u> that the SWO and the Churchwide Women's Organization can fulfill their mission and ministries. The SWO fiscal year ended January 31st and I am delighted to report that the offerings from your units totaled \$21,169. The Synodical Women's Organization sent one half of the total offering received to Churchwide Women of the ELCA (\$10,604).

The ministries supported by the Synodical Women's Organization from the retained offerings include: the Northwester newsletter, scholarships for lay school of ministry students and women seminary students, gifts to Luther Park and Luther Point Bible camps, the two Days of Enrichment held last fall, and SWO board expenses.

#### **REMINDERS:**

- Now is the time to send the yearly \$30 for the Convention Expense Fund (if you haven't yet). Each congregational unit shall submit this yearly to the SWO treasurer to help defray the expenses of the convention, enabling a lower convention registration fee and encouraging more to attend.
- Maria Bvumbwe shared with the SWO board that they have established literacy training for the women
  in Malawi. Please continue to pray for this program in Malawi and that more teachers can be found for
  the literacy training. If your unit would like to contribute funds for the book used in the literacy training,
  please send your Malawi Literacy funds to the SWO treasurer.
- - Thrivent members can request two Thrivent Action Team grants yearly, each for \$250. These
     can be used to purchase batting and other quilting supplies, items for Lutheran World Relief kits, diapers for the food pantry.... consider needs of your congregation or community and apply for the Thrivent Action Team grants.
  - Units are encouraged to collect a Regular Offering every time they meet (Bible Study, fellowship over lunch, making quilts, assembling kits, planning an event). The unit treasurer shares one half of the offerings received with the Synodical Women's Organization, who then shares one half of that amount with the churchwide organization of Women of the ELCA
  - If you're unsure of where to send offerings and which form to use, request an offerings summary page from me. I will e-mail or mail the guide to you.
  - Be sure to share the information in this newsletter with your officers and especially your treasurer.

(Psalm 24: 1)



#### The Stripping of the Altar and reading: "Remembering Holy Week"



On the night of the Passover meal, Jesus unwrapped the unleavened bread from the linens during this special night. When we uncover the communion vessels and elements, we remember our Lord and the night on which he gave instructions to celebrate communion.

Jesus then took bread and gave thanks, broke it and gave it to the disciples to eat. "Do this in remembrance of me". When the bread from communion is removed from the altar, we remember that His body was broken for us.

Jesus also took the cup and gave thanks. "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, given for the forgiveness of sins. Do this in remembrance of me". When the cup is removed from the altar, we remember that his blood was shed for all of us.

The blood of Jesus was shed for many for the forgiveness of sins. When we remove the communion trays with many cups, we remember that this sacrament is not for us individually, but for all people—here and around the world.



After his trial, the cross upon which Jesus hung, was carried out of the city to the place called the 'skull' -Golgotha. When we remove the cross from our midst by carrying it away, we remember the pain of His being mocked and ridiculed, then whipped and made to carry the cross beam. All this he did to carry the burden of our sin.

The women cried loudly when Jesus was led away to be crucified, because they were filled with helplessness, denial and fear of what was taking place. When we remove the joyful presence of flowers from our midst by carrying them away, we remember the hurt and pain of the women, and we share with them in our own sadness.

Jesus, the son of God, experienced the depth of humanity in his innocent suffering and painful death upon the cross. When we remove the two candles from the altar, which reminds of the divinity and the humanity of Jesus, we remember that Jesus humbled himself even to the point of dying upon the cross.



Jesus fell silent while hanging on the cross. When we remove from our midst God's word which speaks to us, we also experience a deep silence and what seems to be an absence of God's presence.

The women who had followed Jesus, now standing near the cross, watching Him die, crying out in pain and grief. When we remove the worship book and stand from our midst, we remember in our worship, our cries for mercy and prayers of longing. Our worship in times of grief is made real in the death of Jesus.

A few days before the Passover meal, Jesus was anointed by a woman. He said that it was done for his burial; it was a gift that she had given. When we remove the offering plates from our midst, we remember the offerings that we have given to Him.



At some time during His crucifixion, the soldiers divided up the clothing of Jesus. When we remove the cloth from the wooden cross, we remember that the clothes worn by Jesus were divided among the soldiers and taken away.

After His death, the body of Jesus was taken down from the cross. His lifeless body was wrapped in white linen and placed in a nearby tomb. The entrance was closed. When we remove the white linens from the altar, we remember the burial of Jesus.

When Jesus was hanging on the cross, He cried out with a loud voice, "It is finished" ... and then He died. When we remove the cloth paraments with symbols describing our Lord's passion, it seems as if it is finished. Christ has died. Now we are confronted with the stark harshness and emptiness of His death.



The light of Christ has gone out. It is done. Christ has died. When we remove the Christ candle from our midst, we remember that the light of the world appears to have been defeated by death.

So it is, that Jesus was laid to rest in a new tomb. Since it was evening, and the beginning of the Sabbath, all who were helping or watching, went to their own homes, filled with sadness, grief and despair. All departed in silence.

#### **Preparing for Lent**

The stars of my Variable Star quilt are made of a wide array of fabrics, everything from florals to dachshunds to paisleys. This scrap quilt is a generous queen size, so in order to make it fit our bed just right, my husband and I know that a particular star has to go on the bottom corner of the bed, just so, and then the rest of the quilt will fall into place. That particular star is made from a wild red floral print, creating a memorable block and placeholder. When that wild red floral print star is in the bottom corner of the bed, the rest of the quilt will hang just right: equal lengths on either side of the bed, with just the right amount to fold back at the top for the pillows.

When I was making up the bed the other morning, it struck me that Lenten disciplines are a bit like that wild red floral print star. When you engage in Lenten disciplines—prayer, fasting, almsgiving, self-reflection—the rest of your life falls right in to place. Your priorities are set in motion, you achieve balance in your life and your relationship with God is realigned.

Ash Wednesday is this week, and we'll recite the extended Confession of Sin that marks the liturgy. We'll be asked to reflect on our lives and examine our thoughts and behaviors. What's the wild red floral star of your life that will help your life fall right into place this Lenten season?

#### A LENTEN IDEA

This is a recycled article from 10 years ago, received from Zion American Lutheran in Granton (Chequamegon Conference). They had used this as a fund-raiser for several years. It helps to get all the members of the congregation involved, entire families can put in their own idea of what to do.



The congregation began by purchasing colored bags (any color will do) for each family. The instructions are to place a specific amount of money into the bag (or other container) for each time a certain action is performed each day. For example, the family may decide to place 5¢ (or other amount, as

decided) each time someone in the family "shoveled snow that day" ... (this year would have brought in LOTS of money) 
Many different slips can be put in each bag or other container, with various activities, taking a walk, feeding a pet, sneezing that day, talking on your phone, checking your email, smiling at someone, went shopping, wearing a belt, drinking a soda or coffee... the list could go on and on and on. You may also want to include other things as a specific amount for each pair of shoes you own, # of TVs/radios you own, # of calendars you have up, # of light bulbs in your living room (or

home), # of hammers in your home, make the list fun and unusual. Get a committee together and work to create

some entertaining and fun ideas, the more the better. Type the ideas onto slips of paper, cut apart and then placed into the previously purchased bags or containers. Distribute the containers with the slips to the congregational families/members as decided. Each family can decide on how much money will be donated for each 'yes' answer. If you choose to do an activity daily, every other day or weekly, attach it to the container where the money is to be collected. Remember, the amount of money can be small or large, it is your choice.

The committee could also choose the final recipient of the money collected, a certain mission project, LWR, the Synod Resource Center, quilting supplies, or your Bible Camp, or one of many different worthy recipients. The idea is to have a project that everyone can have fun doing together!




