FROM THE PRESIDENT

It has been fun meeting with you at your days of renewal and your summer retreats. I may not remember names, but faces are becoming familiar. It's nice to hear about the things that concern you and the work that you are doing for our Lord. And I even enjoy the questions that you bring forward.

Continuing with the "attitude of gratitude" - - - -

We received large posters of gratitude from the New Hope Children's Shelter in Texas for the items we sent in our "Drop Your Drawers" campaign. Some of you saw the drawings at your retreats. The kids made three dimensional flowers, line drawings of soccer players, etc., and signed their names in appreciation of all that we sent. Meanwhile, some federal judge in California decided that detaining children is against the law. I did contact Paul Hernandez, director of Lutheran Social Services of the South, to get a clarification and to see if that ruling affected their work in Texas. It does not. It seems that another organization is holding mothers and children in prison settings!! Unbelievable!!

Because my stepson's company (Go-Macro!) paid for the entire shipping of our "Drop Your Drawers" items, we were able to send all financial donations to the LSS of the South for the work with the unaccompanied minors at the border. This amounted to over \$480 that they can now use for the terrific amount of unmet needs they face.

I am grateful for your generosity!! Our Wisconsin Synod Women of the ELCA are at the top of the heap in our entire region for money sent to church-wide in Chicago. I sensed discouragement in some of the other SWO Presidents because of declines within their organizations, so it is up-lifting to me to report such good news about what you are doing.

The Lutheran World Relief shipping schedule for this fall is now available. Copies are being distributed at retreats and leadership training. In our Synod we are looking at World Relief October 10th for both Eau Claire (Trinity Lutheran on Lexington Blvd.) and Rice Lake (Bethany Lutheran on Messenger Street).

I spent over an hour on the phone the other night in a conference call with our national president, three women from the church-wide office in Chicago, and a dozen other SWO Presidents. Several of them were new to their positions like I was last year. We each had an opportunity to report on doings in our Synod, so I was able to talk about "Drop Your Drawers," your wonderful retreats, and your generosity. We were asked to come up with information about any work in our Synods regarding human trafficking that we can report in February when all SWO Presidents meet again in Chicago. Please let me know of anything in your communities, areas, or churches that is helping to counteract this evil.

Triennial promoter people are being selected as we speak. They will be trained in November and available to come to our gatherings after that. The theme for the Triennial is "All Anew." It will feature a celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation as well as transformation via the Holy Spirit today. Be in dialogue at your church NOW to come up with plans to raise money to send as many women as you can to this Gathering that will be in Minneapolis, July 13-16, 2017, and I found out that it is too early to sign up to volunteer to usher, serve communion or whatever. However, people at our headquarters in Chicago are securing speakers and readying promotional materials. We will be required to elect our seven voting delegates for the Triennial at our convention in April. I have applications for anyone interested in this position that comes with a free registration for the convention part of the Triennial.

Mark your calendars for April 29 and 30th, 2016, for our NW Wisconsin Women of the ELCA convention at the Plaza Hotel and Suites in Eau Claire. The committee is hard at work setting up workshops, getting speakers, and making

other decisions about the different parts of our event. You can contact Janet Allison or myself with your ideas, but do it soon so we have a chance to include them. We are in need of a couple more nominating committee members who will be tasked with finding candidates for secretary and vice president as well as conference reps from Apple River, Chequamegon, Heart of the North and Dairyland. Our "retired" SWO President Marcia Lindseth has graciously agreed to chair the nominations committee, so you can contact her with names of people who might be willing to serve either on the committee (from Dairyland, Lake Superior, or Chippewa Valley) or in one of the Board positions mentioned.



Our next SWO Board meeting includes Conference Coordinators. This will be held at First Lutheran in Barron on November 7th. Agendas and further information about the meeting will be sent at a later date to those who should attend. But meanwhile, you can air your concerns and give your ideas to any SWO Board member or Conference Coordinator. We will do our best to deal with issues that arise.

Thank you for your hospitality at your retreats and events. If your church is having something special, please invite me!! I look forward to being with you.

There are many reasons and ways that we choose to have an opportunity to demonstrate and share our



faith with others. I chose a two day (+) drive with 10 high school students and 4 other adults in 3 vans driving over our nations busy freeways to go to camp with them. It was one of the best decisions I've made at this late stage of my grandma "hood" days. It meant no sleep (I love naps), a long drive, good and not so delightful driving conditions and a great deal of responsibility for our precious cargo.

The trip started on July 17 and we returned home on the 27th. It turned out to be an experience of a lifetime for this grandma and about 114 high school students and

counselors as we learned to live in villages, studied the "Fruits of the Spirit", worshipped together and reached new challenges before us.

Students and counselors throughout the nation merged their lives together and had, as Dave Jarvis, the director at Rainbow Trail Lutheran Camp in Canon City, Colorado, proclaims the best high school camp experience he has had in his 27 years as the director of the Lutheran camp.

As we worshipped together we renewed and strengthened our faith and found hope that this community of believers will return and move in their own church communities and the world knowing that all is well (but challenging) with the walk they have chosen sharing their faith with others in the future.

Experiences were rich, deep, meaningful, and challenging as we lived together with unknowns, worshipped in some way every hour of the day, found our faith when we needed it as we climbed mountains, rode the raft in the raging river, or climbed the low and high rope courses. We learned to trust others when we lost our confidence or questioned ourselves or our faith. It was wonderful to experience the growth with our eight young men and two young women amongst the 114 high schoolers who had come to Rainbow Trail Lutheran Camp. Most came not knowing what to expect. There were some who had been there before. The community of hope that they built has them planning for more. All of our 10 want to return to learn more about themselves, their faith and the life challenges before them. They worked hard to earn the money to go to camp and have plans for returning. They gave up baseball tournaments and their other summer activities to do something they will never forget.

This grandma is so proud of them and will get in better shape so I can climb the mountains, ride the river raft and maybe climb the ropes next summer. I have hope for me and know that there is HOPE for the young men and women who attended and counseled at Rainbow Trails Camp in July of 2015. I thank them for allowing me to be a camp Grandma Mary.

A Gift

I was able to send \$482 donated to the Lutheran Social Services of the South clothes shipping directly to that

agency for more clothing as needed. We appreciate the generosity of the trucking company who decided to donate their space in their truck going south. We are still waiting to hear from Malawi how they would proceed on literacy teaching of women in their synod. We have \$3,098 in that fund by July 1, 2015.

I thank the units who sent in their \$30 convention expense fund donation which will help to greatly keep the price we need to charge as low as possible for the SWO convention next spring in Eau Claire. We have

received \$1,415.00 from this year's donations for convention expenses.

We have started to plan for the conference officers training on Saturday, September 26. Conference treasurers will meet together for one session to discuss details of the job.


Unit treasurers, if you will not be attending your own conference training, you can attend this training. Now that I am on my second year on this job, I may have more information and be able to answer your questions.

STEWARDSHIP

Stewardship can be like an apple tree. We all know that apple trees can grow on their own, but to bear the biggest fruits, the trees must be given annual care. It doesn't take long for the young apple tree to bear fruit, but after a few years the branches have multiplied. Some get entangled with others. Others get so little nourishment that they become weak and unable to bear any weight. Worst of all, the nourishments meant for the fruit are instead devoted to multiplying branches.

What to do? Wish for an orange tree? What about cloning only the "most successful" apple tree. But looking at it from the apple tree's point of view: what if you're not the "successful tree"? Do you want to deny your reality, become something/someone else?

So how do we solve the problem of the overgrown apple tree? We can prune all the branches so the tree looks like a fence post! That way there are no entanglements. One problem though-not much fruit comes from fence posts!

Another solution: Prune the tree so it takes the shape of a ladder and then lift yourself by your roots and climb to heavenly bliss! One problem: you have to have the right technique!

There is a better solution, a way to prune trees carefully. Cut away branches that limit the growth of the other branches. Snip off entangled twigs. This pruning yields a stronger structure, and most of all, now the tree grows many fine, large, tasty and beautiful apples.

Let us be like the well pruned tree - able to bear large, tasty, beautiful apples.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

I was excited to keep track of what was happening at the Youth Gathering in Detroit, MI in July. For those of you who did not follow along, can you imagine 30,000 Lutherans converging on a city, thirty thousand



Lutherans doing service projects, gathering in kind gifts and helping a community that is rebounding from economic crisis. I followed the Youth Gathering on Facebook and was touched and humbled to see our youth cleaning parks, doing yard work, landscaping, painting houses and fixing fences. Along with the youth, our Women of the ELCA were right there beside them. I saw our elected leadership, the Chicago office team and our Bishop joining in, making a difference.

The Women of the ELCA had an anti-sex trafficking exhibit in the Community Life area of the Gathering. The exhibit gave information about recognizing warning signs of sex-trafficked victims and warned how youth can be lured into trafficking through social media such as Facebook. The exhibit collected in kind gifts to make over 1500 hygiene kits that were distributed to seven organizations in Detroit that work with survivors, at-risk youth and victims of human sex trafficking. These kits

were made possible by donations of over \$10,000 from W/ELCA units and individuals and donations from the youth attending. The youth made cards of encouragement to put into the hygiene kits, adding a personal, caring touch.

I know this is an issue that has touched our women and is moving us to action. I know that our youth are also concerned and want help put an end to trafficking. What can we do to help provide opportunities to join together with our youth to raise awareness of trafficking and make a difference? tab and click on Justice then on Human Trafficking. There is a link to the posters is in the article. One of the posters lists the following clues someone is being trafficked; under 18 and selling sex; trading sex for money, food, housing or clothes; frequently seen at hotels/motels; tattoos signifying "ownership"; pictured in online ads for sex.
